WELCOME TO THE ACADEMY CONFERENCE 2024

The overall theme for the 2024 Academy Conference is "Transformational Tourism in Disruptive Times". The world has experienced many disruptive innovations, environmental changes, and disasters as a result of the pandemic, global climate change, and economic and political instability. These disruptions have resulted in huge changes within society including tourism with these 'forces of change' continuing to dominate society. The Academy along with its partners within the tourism community must consider this future.

Orlando is an ideal location to explore modern mass-tourism growth, current and future disruptive challenges to be faced, and those transformational opportunities that lie ahead as it navigates the roller-coaster ride of global tourism change. With its origins dating back to the late 1830s and the height of the Seminole Wars, Orlando was incorporated in 1875 with it growing steadily over the next century from being the hub of Florida's citrus industry to a high-tech center for the nearby Cape Canaveral NASA aerospace complex in the 1950s to what it is today, a global mega-destination attracting more than 75 million visitors in pre-pandemic 2019. The catalyst for its tourism growth was the opening of Walt Disney World in 1971, closely followed by International Drive in 1972, SeaWorld in 1973, the Orange County Convention Center in 1983, and Universal Orlando more recently in 1990.

In this context, the 2024 Academy Conference will take place with our collective purpose being to identify basic 'principles' that might 'guide' tourism research in the future to positively affect its development. With this vision for the Conference, the first day will feature research by Academy Fellows and invited North American scholars focusing on the forces of change and their impact on tourism futures. The second day will introduce Fellows to the increasingly diverse tourist offer Orlando has to offer, before visiting one of its world-leading theme parks to savor the more traditional Orlando experience. The third and fourth days will continue with research by Academy Fellows, Invited Guest Scholars, and Emerging Scholars while discussing how the Academy might play a more impactful role in transforming tourism.

I welcome you to the Academy Conference so that we can benefit from the most renowned scholars and their knowledge and experience in discussing the future of tourism. I sincerely hope that we agree upon some form of 'guidelines' that outlines how tourism research can contribute to shaping a positive tourism future and the world at large.

I would like to thank the entire team of UCF Rosen College, especially Academy Fellows Alan Fyall, Youcheng Wang, and Abraham Pizam for their tireless work to make this conference possible despite numerous difficulties and uncertainties that occurred during the planning phase. Without them we would not be here today!

Nearest Airport: Orlando International Airport (MCO). All major airlines fly to MCO with many direct. If you are extending your trip, you can fly easily from Orlando to the entire United States, Canada, Mexico, the Caribbean, and South America. For the latter, many flights are routed through Miami (American Airlines Hub) or Atlanta (Delta Hub). Although Atlanta is the largest airport in the world, it is extremely easy for connecting flights.

Hotel Accommodation: The conference is being held at Rosen College with the <u>Rosen Centre</u> serving as our primary conference hotel. It is a very pleasant hotel located on the southern end of International Drive. It is a convention-style hotel but is ideal for family/friends etc. Orlando is exceptionally busy with March-June peak periods for leisure and business travel. The Rosen College and Rosen Centre Hotel are located within the International Drive (I-Drive) area. International Drive has a huge choice of hotels at all price points if you prefer to stay elsewhere. If you prefer something at the top end of the market, then the Four Seasons is a beautiful property. The Ritz Carlton and Disney's Wilderness Lodge are also very popular but are more distant from the conference location. Universal Orlando has built many midmarket hotels of late that are extremely popular and easy to access to the theme parks, with their properties very popular with families. Universal's premier hotel (managed by Loews) is Portofino Bay which is wonderful while Sapphire Falls also comes highly recommend.

Orlando and Central Florida – Things To Do: Although known around the world for its industry-leading theme parks and attractions, there is so much more to offer the discerning tourist when visiting Orlando, Florida. So much so that it is estimated that you would need 121 days to see everything the destination has to offer! In an article published recently in the UK's Daily Telegraph, Orlando was described as an "underrated" city with so much more to see and do than simply ... heading to the parks! This theme was also taken up recently by Travel+Leisure in their article on Winter Park, a short journey to the north of Downtown Orlando, often described as the European face of Central Florida with its cobblestone streets and Michelin-recognized restaurants. Perhaps the most surprising, and arguably the most stunning, local attractions are the many natural springs that feature across Central Florida. If the thought of meeting a gator makes you nervous, a distinct possibility in the springs, then you may prefer to frequent one of the many beaches on Florida's Atlantic Coast, only 50 minutes from Orlando. Then again, you need to be careful, especially if visiting New Smyrna Beach, the shark bit capital of the world!!
